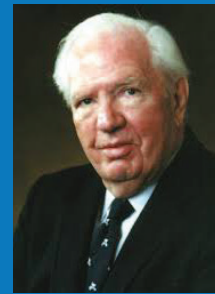

Louis F. Albright, M.D.



Louis F. Albright, M.D., graduated from Hahnemann Medical College in 1930 and then furthered his studies in Internal medicine and Cardiology at Mount Sinai and Johns Hopkins. In 1942, Dr. Albright assumed the directorship of the hospital’s Division of Cardiovascular Disease, a position he would hold for some 34 years. Between 1946 and 1965, he also was Director of Medicine and, in 1953, became Chief of Staff serving in this triple capacity until 1959.

Active in the medical community outside Jersey Shore University Medical Center, Dr. Albright held positions as President of the New Jersey Heart Association (1953-55), a Trustee of the Medical Society of New Jersey (1961-70), and a Trustee of the New Jersey Hospital Association (1970-81), among others.

During Dr. Albright’s more than half century of professional commitment to medicine and Jersey Shore, he actively mentored other physicians. Through leadership positions with the state and national Medical Society and within the Jersey Shore University Medical Center professional family, he actively fostered continuing medical education and long after retiring from general practice taught classes for Jersey Shore’s interns and residents.

Dr. Albright was recognized for his tremendous contributions on numerous occasions – by the Jersey Shore Foundation, the Ann May Alliance, and the Salvation Army. Most recently, our department awarded him its first Lifetime Achievement Award and established this annual educational event in his honor.

Dr. Albright died on October 29, 2002 at the age of 96. His legacy will endure through the achievement and quality care that he inspired us to pursue. We are grateful for his family’s continued involvement with our institution. It is through the generosity of his daughters, Mrs. Bobbi Gille and Mrs. Mary L. Johnston, and the Louis F. & Reberta C. Albright Foundation that we are able to bring you the annual Louis F. Albright, M.D., Cardiology Symposium.
